





### THE LOOM

We have acquired a loom! One and a quarter spinning wheels, a reel, two swifts and assorted left over bits. One piece, though beautifully constructed, no-one knows what it is

This summer the McKay family removed this material from the loft over the summer kitchen. It has probably been stored there for over eighty years. They generously offered it to us. We wish to acknowledge this gift from the McKays and commend their desire to preserve this bit of our history.

There was one major problem! The loom was in pieces. Huge, heavy pieces. No-one thought to leave the instructions as to which parts were A & B, or if tab C went into hole D. A half day of questioning and study at the weaving house and reference library at Upper Canada Village was helpful. Finally with the assistance of Kathy Shine and Diane McLaughlin the pieces started to go together. A large pry bar and an eight pound sledge hammer were very helpful too. We wish to thank these ladies for their assistance, especially Kathy for her research and the copied material she provided.

Missing a few bits, the loom at least looked operative for the Heritage Fair. Thanks to more searching by Hugh McKay, we also have a piece of rag carpet woven on this loom and some material prepared for use. Audrey Newell gathered information from Miss Sadie Allen on the original owner of the loom. Isn't it interesting how a jig saw puzzle with no picture can be pieced together?

This type of loom was very common in Ontario. It is probably of Scottish origin. Made so that they could be taken apart and stored when not in use, some looms of this type were made of old ship's timbers. They needed to be strong and solid to stand up to the steady use. If the house were large enough, a room or attic was set aside for the weaving equipment. Sometimes the loom was set up in a barn or shed. The weaving was done by a member of the family, by a neighbour who was skilled, or sometimes by a travelling weaver.

This loom belonged to Miss Eliza Allen, the oldest member of the Allen family, sister of Robert, aunt of John, great-aunt of Miss Sadie Allen. The family moved from the farm (now McKay) and lived beside the present fire hall, then in the brick house beside the United Church. Eliza operated her spinning wheel and loom here to make money. She wove carpet "strips" which were sewn together to make carpets. Eliza lived with her nieces and nephews, living with John for 10 years. She moved to Brockville to live with her sister Mary, where she died in 1921. She is buried in the family plot on the farm (McKay).

#### RAG CARPET

Floors in the homes were often cold and drafty and a covering was needed. The pioneer wife soon found a way to add warmth and colour to her floors. Every scrap of material was saved. These were cut into strips, sewn together, and wound into balls. A heavy cotton warp was set up on the loom and the rags were used as weft. Often they were dyed in bright colours. This rag carpet was so popular that it continued to be made into our own century.

#### WALKING WHEEL

This wheel was a very common one in Ontario. It required the spinner to walk back and forth, and it was said she might walk 20 miles during a day's spinning. The thread was brought to the tip of the spindle and held out while the wheel spun. A slight turn in the opposite direction brought the yarn back to the centre of the spindles, where it was wound on. The procedure was repeated until the spindle was full.

REEL


A reel is a rotary instrument on which the yarn was wound after it was spun. A reel was 54" around. It had a device which counted the turns. When 40 rounds were completed it made a loud snapping noise. A skein, therefore, was 2160" or 180' long.


**SWIFT** 


A swift was a kind of reel, sometimes of an adjustable diameter, on which a skein of yarn was placed in order to be wound off into a ball. These were often home-made and took many forms. Did you ever hold a skein of wool over your two arms while your grandmother of mother wound













Charlott Griffen at the Loom



Assembled Loom




Jeremy Brown demonstrates spinning








#### **JOHN QUINN DIARY**

Again this issue we bring you some more notes from Mr. Quinn's diary, this time for the last six months of 1897. Spelling is original.

July 4-10: Terrible hot week, temperatures from 90 to 118.

July 11-17: LOL had a church parade on Sun. Mon. the 12th the Orangeman went to Watertown. Tommy Donivan died. In Sat's note he says he has 48 pigs.

July 18-24: Cutting, raking and coocking up hay. Drew in 10 loads in one day..

July 25-31: Cool and wet week. John Quinn and family and Aunt Mary Ann came to visit.

Aug. 1-7: Very hot week. Helping neighbours with having.

Aug. 8-14: Harvesting and howing potatoes. Helped Rolend Johnston to saw wood half day, 50 cents. Addie Johnston died.

Aug. 15-21: Cutting oats, pulling peas and thrashing. Went to barn raising at Richard Williams. John Tailor died.

Aug. 22-28: Drawing in oats and thrashing.

Aug. 29-Sept. 4: Cut millet. Helping W.N. Bowen harvest and thrash.

Sept. 5-11: Helping W.N. Bowen to draw in oats, \$1.00 a day. Went picking long blackberries.

Sept. 12-18: Breaking stone in the pit and drawing it to road,\$1.00 a day breaking, \$2.00 drawing with horses. Mrs. Robt. Allen died.

Sept. 19-25: Went thrashing with J.E. Steacy. I was down to Rock Field Sat. afternoon.

Sept. 26-Oct. 2: Cutting corn and filling Albert Greer's silo.

Oct. 3-9: Went to Rockport on Sun. Tue. first day of Lansdowne fair.

Oct. 10-16: Mr. Ruttle died. Went thrashing with Loftes Foley.

Oct. 17-23: Went to Gananoque with Patsy Sullivan to pay a note to David Darling. Finished drawing in potatoes, 30 bushels. Peater Doil died. Went out to tent (camp meeting?).

Oct. 24-30: Thrashers here, thrashed 330 bushel. Froze very hard on Fri. night.

Nov. 1-6: Plowed all week. Ground very dry and hard.

Nov. 7-13; Big smashup on GTR at Lansdowne Sun. morning, 5 cars burnt, 2 persons killed. 3 " snow fell.

Nov. 14-20: Thrashing. I sat up with C.E. Earl all night, he is very sick.

Nov.21-27: Commenced to feed stock for the first time. Ground is frozen very hard.

Nov. 28- Dec. 4: Helping neighbours thrash. Charley Bradley died. Went to Gananoque for sum flour.

Dec. 5-11: Thrashing with Steacy Brothers.

Dec. 12-18: Very heavy rain and warm, frost all out of ground. Sat. very cold and blustery, a Bout 4" of snow. Lots of sleighs out to Day, first sleighing of year.

Dec. 19-25: Helping thrash and grind grain. Drew home load of wood. A very cold and blustery Christmas Day.

John Quinn and family here.

Dec. 26-31: Mon. Nomination Day. Thrashing at O.W. Landon's, 2700 bushels. Mrs. Charles Stewart died.

The year ends fine but very cold but not much snow.

Times are very good and prices fare.

Wheat is worth \$1.02 a bushel

Oats 24 cents a bushel

Barley 35 cents a bushel

Bass ? 45 cents a bushel

Pork \$5.75 a hundert

Beef \$2.50 to \$4 a hundert

### THE ISRAEL BOWEN FAMILY by Alan Lindsay

Family records state that Israel Bowen was born in Halifax. He and his wife Isabella came to Lansdowne via the USA in 1796 and settled on Concession 3 west of the village. They are said to have had several sons, but only two are known: John Lamb 1790 - 1862 and David 1796 - 1871/81. About 1818 they moved to South Elmsley (Lombardy) where Isabella died about 1830. John Lamb remained in Lansdowne and David went to Mooretown, Ontario (near Sarnia) where he founded the Mooretown Carriage Works. Israel joined David after Isabella's death and died there in 1848 at 100 years of age.

#### THE LANSDOWNE REPORTER

Many times we have been asked for details about the Lansdowne Reporter. We have had copies of the first issue in the files for some time, but were not sure when it stopped publication. This summer Doug Donevan gave us several copies, one of which was the last copy.

The first issue was published on Friday December 5, 1947; and the final issue was Friday March 30, 1951. Cost: 5 cents per copy, \$2.00 per year.

The Lansdowne Reporter was published by the parent, Gananoque Reporter, Gerald A. Scott, publisher. The Managing-Editor, Mr. Richard Duff, had served with the Black Watch from 1914-19. Mr. Duff had trade experience in Scotland before coming to Canada in 1926. In Canada he was on the staff of Saturday Night, Toronto Globe and Mail, Timmins Daily Press, and the Hespler Herald.
